

This year has been a challenging time for Scotland as we change and adapt to the impact of Covid-19. Land can play a significant part to the recovery and, as our work has shown over the last year, the ways we own and use land are central to creating a wellbeing economy. It is clearer than ever that land needs to be part of our economic thinking as we address recovery, renewal and climate action.

The Scottish Land Commission is working to make more of Scotland's land by stimulating fresh thinking and change in how we, as a nation, own and use land, so that the benefits from our land can be shared more widely across the population.

Throughout 2020-21 we have delivered a substantial programme of research and engagement, providing recommendations to Government and guidance to a range of stakeholders and communities.



Strategic Plan 2020-2023

Our <u>new strategic plan</u>, published in September 2020, focuses on where land reform can make the biggest difference to promoting recovery and renewal including action to reduce inequality, support climate action, and give people and communities in Scotland the ability to bring about positive change.

Reforming land rights



Legislative proposals to address the impact of Scotland's concentration of land ownership

Our discussion paper, <u>Legislative proposals to address the</u> impact of Scotland's concentration of land ownership, looks at three specific proposals for new legislative mechanisms and how they could work in practice. The measures are based on ideas which are normal in other countries and sectors to help markets operate effectively and safeguard the public interest. Vacant and Derelict Land Taskforce Recommendations

Taskforce made a <u>series of recommendations</u> to Scottish Government to transform Scotland's approach to tackling the legacy of derelict land. In response Scottish Government announced a new £50m Vacant and Derelict Land Fund.



Regional Land Use Partnerships

We made <u>recommendations to Scottish Government</u> on the establishment of new Regional Land Use Partnerships to deliver on Scotland's big ambitions on climate action and help support green economic recovery. Five areas are now piloting the partnerships and will help inform future decisions on their wider establishment.



Reforming land markets



Review of Land for Housing

Published a series of six research papers examining Scotland's existing approach to land for housing, new housing supply in rural Scotland, and looking at evidence from across the UK and Europe. We are bringing the findings together as a set of recommendations to be published later in 2021.



Tax

Set up an Expert Advisory Group on Tax on Land and Property to advise the Commission and help shape recommendations to Ministers on reforms to taxes on land and property to help Scotland develop a robust, resilient wellbeing economy.
